## "Odd Couple?"

It is a new fiscal year, so with this issue, we begin a new theme for our four quarterly issues of Depth Soundings. The theme this year is "Comfort and Joy" found throughout scriptures. These words struck me as odd years ago one Christmas as our choir sang "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." It did not make sense to me that comfort would be paired with joy. An odd couple indeed.

But now as I've looked up "comfort" passages in my concordance, every occurrence is paired with joy in the same verse, an earlier verse, or a verse that follows. They go together – always. When comfort is needed and it comes, there is joy. So my prayer is that you enjoy this theme of much needed comfort – and the joy that is always with it.

## "Tidings of Comfort and Joy"

When I hear "comfort and joy," I think of Christmas music, which in turn makes me want Christmas cookies so it's a dangerous mental path to start tracing. The line repeats 15 times in "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," a hymn that dates at least as far back as the 16th century.

"God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen" has appeared in a host of hymnals, in a Dickens story, and even on a Garth Brooks CD. So most English-speaking people probably know the phrase about comfort and joy even if they don't recognize the context. Fewer people know where the line got its origins, though. An angelic being declared most of it to shepherds in Luke 2 as a prelude to the announcement of Jesus' birth. "I bring you good tidings of great joy." Notice, though, that the angel only says the tidings are of joy, not comfort. But the hymnwriter(s) added the word "comfort."

Whv?

Why is the news that God is coming near-- so close that we can touch God and feel God's breath on our faces-- a message of comfort?

We usually associate "comfort" with alleviating pain or distress. It's a theme Jesus picks up on, saying "Blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted" in Matthew 5. He also told His disciples that He would not "leave them orphans" in John 14. Paul seizes the idea in II Corinthians 1:3-4 where he uses the word "comfort" four times to describe who God is, what God does, and what we should do for each other.

I have never liked the idea of "comforting." If you need to be comforted, you're in distress or pain. Why not avoid the original distress (and the subsequent comfort) altogether?

Because it's in comforting and being comforted that we draw close-- closer to God and closer to each other.

Researchers have found that young apes comfort each other with hugs when they're in distress. The apes that are most likely to offer comfort? Those raised by their parents. Orphaned apes will scream far longer than their peers with parents, unable to comfort themselves or each other.

But we are not left orphaned according to Jesus. We have been given tidings of joy to comfort ourselves and each other.

What words of comfort do you hear God speaking to you? What tidings of comfort is God giving you to speak to someone else? Isaiah 40:1 reminds us that God wills both our joy to be complete and our Way comforted: "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God." (NRSV) The joy God gives is indeed that

this comfort and joy are not only for this life, but eternal life. The face of God is a constant discovery and is available for comfort and joy to us at all times and in all places! ## "Even in the Weeds, YOU Are There"

I spent a lot of time this Winter and Spring digging turf grass out of flower beds. Good things in the wrong place become weeds. Its hard work, and dirty if you do it right – but it prepares the way for new things.

Six months after I retired from 39 years of serving as a parish pastor, the global pandemic closed the world. It was a harrowing experience – scary and frightful and confusing. But my hermit self was happy to be home and able to focus on long-delayed projects. One of those was clearing turf grass – which spreads by running roots underground – from flower beds. This also is harrowing – the agricultural process of preparing the soil for a new crop.

"It's hard work and dirty if you do it right. But it is also holy." The more I cleaned the soil, the more God cleaned from me. It became a spiritual exercise. This is not unlike the "harrowing of hell" which the early Church understood to be Jesus' work on Holy Saturday. Throughout the Spring the Holy Spirit's synchronicity of readings and reflections and repeated digging reinforced again and again the

work God was doing in me – clearing out the tangle of a beautiful old identity; preparing the soil for whatever new thing God is going to do in my life and in my relationships (Isaiah 43:19); cleaning out the identity of pastor and discovering again the shadow-self which has been waiting for this opportunity. It is hard work, and dirty if you do it right. But it is also holy – holy work – because God is in it and God works beside us as we do these things.

"In His hand are the deep places of the earth" (Psalm 95:4) – and you, and me. "Deep calls unto deep . . ." (Psalm 42:7). Here God has something to teach me – and you – and all of us. Here God keeps calling you and me and us to listen. *Beautiful* things in the wrong place become weeds. God cannot do God's new thing (Isaiah 42:7) until we have removed the old things. It is hard work, and dirty if you do it right. But it is also holy!

With apologies to John Updike (*Seven Stanzas at Easter*; www.inallthings. org), if there is to be a resurrection let it be <u>harrowing</u> – earthy and physical and dirty and filled with promise and thus all-the-more holy.

And again John Updike ("Hoeing" www.poetry-fromthehart.blogspot.com): I sometimes fear the younger generation will be deprived / of the pleasures of hoeing; / there is no knowing / how many souls have been formed by this simple exercise . . . . Ignorant the wise boy who / has never performed this simple, stupid, and / useful wonder.

If there is to be a resurrection, let it be harrowing! May it be so. For us all. (Thanks to Robert for this article and for his faithful support of and participation with The Anchorage over many years. He served as a Servant Leader from 2007-2010 and was Chair his last year. Robert served as a Lutheran parish pastor in South Carolina from 1980 to 2019. He and his wife Debbie live in Clemson and enjoy the blessings of their grown children and grandchildren.)

deciding to put Peggy's Service Award picture there. Then I realized her picture is also a picture of inspiration. Here's why. She is not Jesus, but over the last 21 years of enjoying her help with The Anchorage and even more years of friendship, she has lived a life of "foot-washing" for many of us. I see Jesus in her and it's Jesus in her that I want to praise and He is the one to whom she gives credit. Her favorite verse is Phil. 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Our friendship began when we both worked at GHS (now PRISMA) in the early 90's. She was an encourager to me to start The Anchorage in 1998 and came on board as a Servant Leader in 1999 when she retired from full time at GHS and began her parish nurse ministry in her church. Just a few highlights need to be mentioned. In 2009, I asked for a 3-month sabbatical in the fall of 2010. She agreed to fill my role with the help of Margaret Vincent our office manager. All plans were on go until May of 2010. Because Peggy has a medical background, I asked her to join me and my husband, Skeeter, to hear the results of a breast cancer biopsy. I somehow knew it would be positive

and was already preparing for the "ride" of cancer treatment. Sabbatical time became chemo time. We were aware of God's providence in already having The Anchorage covered before the diagnosis. They didn't miss a beat taking care of business.

About a year after treatment was over, I decided to step away and we hired a new Director. By the time of the first meeting, she was aware that The Anchorage needed to close, for insufficient funds. Peggy was there and told me about the decision. I realized the work it was to get the 501c3 designation and decided to come back without salary so we could take more time to discern what to do. We took 6 months to listen for God's leading, while lying fallow for a year. Thanks to Peggy we are still here 10 years later, offering hope and contemplative space to those who seek it.

Besides these big moments in our history, Peggy was there for lots of little ways of helping, her specialty. Such as getting table-clothes for an event and using her RV as a place for retreatants to sleep. It goes on and on.

Peggy has just completed another 3-year term as Servant Leader (her 3rd) and is moving to Cary, NC, so this tribute seems in order. Please note the wording on her award does not have an ending year for her service, as we are grateful that she plans to continue as an Advisor.
