"Bear with One Another"

Our theme for this year seems to be God-inspired and my hope is that this issue of Depth Soundings will help with the healing that we may need.

Last month I began reading a book that was like a glass of cool water on a hot summer day, and it soothed my parched soul. As I read, it became evident that contemplative community is an antidote, or better, a healing balm to disable the power of this onslaught to our souls.

In the School of Contemplation by Andre Louf, Abbot of a Trappist Monastery in France (1963-1997), is a compilation of his talks and letters. He said, "Christian community is built upon human weakness; and is a place of forgiveness and healing." My hope is that our communities of faith are places where we can claim our brokenness and our need for God. God's grace and mercy abound!

Andre Louf says, "In a community that lives the Gospel, it has been granted us to enter with our weaknesses, indeed almost because of them. We have been accepted just as we are as a gift from God. Every weakness reveals something of the strength and love of God.... Jesus came for those sinners that we in fact are, and not for the righteous that we thought we were, that we hoped to become or appear to be, secure at the heart of Christian community." Until we can grasp our weakness and our need for God, we will keep trying to do it all ourselves. I think God wants to help!

In March I wrote a piece for the local paper. In it I said we were entering a time when we would need God's help. A friend had bought a newspaper with the headlines, "Primaries Come to SC" and the sales clerk said, "God Help us All." I said our best hope was to ask God for help and suggested that we pause before speaking - to weigh our words. We need to 'bear with one another" in our brokenness, for healing. God dwells in each of us; it is our call to look for God in each other. Our Triune God is our Source of Love! God is giving us all we need. Just ask God for help.

"Christian Community"

Is a Christian community different from a secular community? Should Christians seek community as opposed to living independently of likeminded people? And does it make any difference? Our creator seems to think so. Speaking of his new creation, Adam, God said, "It is not good for man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable to him." [Gen. 2:18] So from the beginning is seems that we were designed for relationship, destined to be social people. The individual is not complete living in isolation.

Broadly speaking, Christians can demonstrate community at a number of levels, but our western culture, particularly American individualism, works against it. Many of us grow up believing that we must make our own way, "make a name for ourselves," and that the accumulation of material wealth is the measure of individual and societal success.

The ideal Christian community, however, in addition to eschewing wealth as a measure of success is distinguished by three important empowering characteristics. The first characteristic is how the Apostle Paul sees community as fundamental to our faith. He sees believers - the Body of Christ - as an interdependent group that draws on and expresses the unique gifts and strengths of each member so that the community in Christ can be light and salt to the world.

For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. [Romans 12: 4-5]

So here we have a community of believers - local, national, and international - who function at a unique individual and community level. Each member of the community is giving and receiving from every other member so that their combined spiritual and material resources fulfill the mission of the community, i.e. the Church.

The second defining characteristic of Christian community is what holds it together. Yes, leadership is important, but it's

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"Seeing"

I wonder if, like me, you sometimes feel the daily news overpowering these days. Night after night I'm tempted to turn the TV off or put the newspaper down, but I believe what a holy woman taught me many years ago, that a true follower of Jesus must always keep the Word of God in one hand and he newspaper in the other. "For God so loved the world," this world of 2016, "that He sent His only Son" to save it. This world is saved. It matters, I think that despite my temptation to remove myself and not to see, not to look, not to witness the heart wrenching situations and faces that fill my living room in any given newscast, my care matters. Although quite powerless to change most of what my eyes see, the very seeing gives witness to the care in my heart.

Jesus often asks, "do you see?" "do you want to see?" Seeing in the Scripture is both gift and call. Teilhard de Chardin puts it this way, "Seeing. One could say that the whole of life lies in seeing... to try to see more and to see better is not, therefore, just a fantasy, curiosity, or a luxury. SEE or PERISH." (the Human Phenomenon, 1999)

True seeing, the kind that keeps us from "perishing" in our helplessness each evening at the news, can only come from a deep looking both at God in quiet contemplation and at the hundreds of faces that come before us night after night. It's a slow process, to accept the gift of seeing truly, with the eyes of our hearts and of assuming the responsibility that that entails. John Moffitt gives us some guidelines for this kind of deep seeing.

To look at anything,
If you would know that thing,
You must look at it long...
You must BE the thing you see...
You must enter in...
You must take your time
And touch the very peace
They issue from.
(excerpted from To Look at Anything by John Moffitt)

We need faith-eyes to see this way, faith eyes to be searching in every newscast and in every newspaper, for the Face of God, who is revealed to us in each human face; those we live with, or work with, or build community with as well as those faces we may never see again. Each one holds the mystery we are longing to see, we only need the faith-eyes to see, deeply and truly. We shall not 'perish' however confusing or chaotic or senseless our everyday world may be. No, the promise of our God is sure. **"You shall see the Face of God and LIVE."** (Rev. 22:4, Mat, 5:8)

more than that. It's a shared vision rooted in the love of God and neighbor. Selfless love is the glue that unifies this community. And this love of God and neighbor is not an option for the Christian, it's a commandment. But mature Christians don't love out of obedience but out of a transformed heart and mind. They are awake to the Christ that lives in them.

Finally, the Christian community is not limited to the temporal sphere only. The Trinity is our model, again totally giving and totally receiving. The Father, the Son, and The Holy Spirit each have unique ministries and yet they are one, completely unified in love. The ideal Christian community, then, will be an expression of our triune God who empowers it.

The Christian community as we know it today is not perfect. It is full of broken people who suffer from broken relationships and sick bodies. But the community, because of the strengths mentioned above, is also a healing, reconciling body that draws on the love of God for renewal and empowerment. The degree to which its individual members can receive all as from God and to give all in the name of God will influence how dynamic the community will be as an expression of God's love.

In summary, the Christian community is unique because its mission grows out of members who don't measure success by cultural individualism and material wealth but who selflessly serve each other, demonstrate unconditional love for God and each other, and because they seek to model the perfect community of the Trinity.
