And his words in Mark 10:15, "Whoever does not receive the kingdom as a little child will never enter it" is such a huge encouragement to me! I hope it is to you. It means many things, but at least part of it is that we don't have to have all the answers! It is another invitation to let go of our striving and just let God love us.

"Always We Begin Again"

I began my life in the United States in 1977 after I graduated from a high school in South Korea. Since then, there were many milestone beginnings: going to an art school in New York City, going to a seminary in New Jersey,

being ordained as a pastor in South Carolina Annual Conference of United Methodist Church, and being appointed to different churches by the bishop.

When I retired in June 2022 after 32 years of ministry, I knew it was another beginning for me and remembered a quote by St. Benedict, "Always we

begin again." I wondered what that means for a retired pastor. I was excited to retire from the busy life of a pastor and wondered, 'If I am not a pastor, then who am I?'

I had to begin again to let go of what was and learn to welcome what is. I came back to Lexington community where I lived for 20 years, and I decided to go back to the church community that I served for 15 years. However, I took a year off intentionally from worshiping in person and meeting with people to give new pastors room to get to know the congregation and for me to unlearn being a pastor in charge.

After the first year of retirement, I still have not found my routine. I am not disciplined enough to do what God wants or what I desire to do or be. As I begin each day, I ask myself, 'How do I take myself lightly? How do I resist trying to come up with answers or resolutions?'

"Always we begin again" is not about major milestone accomplishments. It is about unlearning things, learning new and simple things. I never gardened before. I regret not watering my mother's beautiful vegetable garden when she had to be away even after she pleaded. I used to say to her, "Ask God to water it while you are gone. You and God work it out." Now I have a few flowers in the ground and a few little plants in pots. I wonder who is going to water my plants while I am out of town. I bought a wildflower seed bag and threw them on the ground. I had a no idea what was going to happen. I don't claim to be a gardener. But I am glad to be a beginner. I smile looking at little flowers and new shoots coming out.

Does God smile at me? Do I smile at God? Do I smile at my friends and families or strangers? Today, I begin again with a smile. I don't know what got into me . . . By Michael Fleenor

After decades, I did it again. As I approach the mythic Biblical 3 score and 10, I thought I was beyond doing such a thing ... But I did it again anyway . . . After living in Asheville for nearly 10 years, I refrained from indulging myself even when surrounded by them.

I bought a guitar.

It must be a delusion of old age that surfaced after I attended the 4-day Merlefest in Wilkesboro, NC in May. During my youth with nearly an exclusive immersion in church music, I found myself absorbed into a wider variety of music genres including bluegrass, country, rock, ballad, blues and old time. Sure, I was familiar with all of these, I just was convinced that they were a distraction from the "real thing" at church. To my surprise, as I investigated my genealogy and previously unknown facts of our family that literally brought me into the world, the music of my ancestors came to pull at me.

My previous experience with a guitar was in college over 50 years ago. Then, I had little money, so the guitar I bought was of marginal quality. I hit my first obstacle when practice became a painful affair. Was it going to be

worth the pain? Would I ever get used to it? Would I

ever get good at it?

Little did I know then that that guitar's high "setting" required a great deal of force to depress the strings to produce clear sounding notes and it seriously limited my practice time to no more than 15-30 minutes per day. Even the callouses that finally

began to develop only slightly mitigated the pain of playing. Beyond that, I tried to teach myself how to play from books because I thought I couldn't afford lessons with the additional time and the expenses with the cost of studying other things. So, like many aspirations, my music "career" was uninspired and died for lack of air.

What am I learning now? A better quality guitar has less "action" and the need to exert high force on the strings. Commit to one: It is less painful. Take lessons from a master and be faithful to practice every day. Don't be a perfectionist; enjoy the process and forgive yourself for mistakes and good music will eventually come. Repetitious refrains are the way to "muscle memory" and playing music naturally without thinking. In other words, repeat . . . pause, take a deep breath . . . repeat. Then, once you have the basics down, learn to improvise. Every song you learn gets better. And the most important lesson: You are never too old to learn . . . and its corollary, "Better late than never!"

Is all of this a painless process? No, I still feel the bite of the strings on my tender fingertips. I get frustrated some days with slow progress: I simply don't like missing notes; but I correct my errors by watching the teacher and gradual progress has been noticeable. Is it easy with old fingers? No, but the music seems to come in spite of it.

Come to think of it, isn't this The Way of a creative spiritual journey with Christ? Every note, clear or buzzing, can become a joyful noise.


"A Book for Our Time"


